April 18, 1956 - October 15, 2018

Leslie Susan Bell Rosenberg (Sarah Bashka), 62, of Austin, Texas, daughter of Bernie and Betty Belle, passed away in the early hours of October 15, 2018. She died in a car crash alongside her youngest daughter Sophie.

Leslie, originally from Monticello, New York, lived a full and eclectic life, sharing her zest and passion with everyone who was blessed to know her. Leslie was a creative soul in every imaginable way, a pianist, artist, and life-long learner-- waking up at 5am for yoga-dance parties and getting her yoga teaching certification three years ago. Graduating from high school early at age sixteen, she was eager to explore the world. Her formal education was focused on music at Boston University and she painted a large mural of a piano on the wall of her apartment. California soon called to her so she could be with her brother and good friend. Leslie was always drawn to an opportunity to participate or host a family party, a trait of her personality that has brought so many people together throughout her life to celebrate. In Los Angeles she got her cosmetology license and had her first child. Soon afterwards, she met the love of her life, Jay, to whom she remained married until her death.

Leslie had a precocious and inspiring spirit, encouraging everyone around her to follow their heart. If she saw any way to help you, she would not miss an opportunity to do everything in her power to do so, whether it be putting you in touch with the incredible community she always had around her (everyone was just a phone call away and her phone book was full of people eager to hear from her) or showing up at your house with something to make you feel loved.

She was passionate about everything she could explore in the world and loved living abroad. She was an amazing wife, traveling with her husband to five continents around the world. They moved to Zurich, Switzerland with four of their children and moved back to the USA eight years later with eight kids in tow when they settled in Austin, Texas. And then of course, she had to have two native Texan babies to complete the family. Her pride and joy was her family, and she was always finding the most innovative and wonderful

ways to bring them joy. She was thrilled to be a grandmother, welcoming everyone into her home, where there wasn't a moment of being an empty-nester. She spent her time with her eight grandkids, teaching them the Cha-Cha, pampering them with love and affection. She was always looking for gifts for everyone around her, no reason needed, surprising people (and animals) with anything she thought would make them smile, chocolate oranges, essential oils, dog treats, and nail kits just to name a few.

Leslie was a committed member of Agudas Achim community in Austin, Texas. She was frequently seen at services, of course adorned with one of her many amazing hats from her extensive collection, and almost always accompanied by one or more members of her large and always growing family who loved being in her presence. It speaks to Leslie's character that she passed away as she had lived, going out of her way to do something kind for her daughter.

She will be remembered with love and smiles for her vivaciousness. Always on the move, she made every effort to make sure her family had everything they needed. Her relentless energy and effervescent spirit will always be in the hearts of her loving children, family, and everyone she touched.

She is survived by her husband, Jay Rosenberg, and nine of her ten children: Lindsay, Jonathan, Daniel, Tzippy, Jakob, Julie, Emily, Jesse, Jason, eight grandchildren, and two siblings.

“ For as long as I knew Leslie, she was always smiling, often laughing, so upbeat, so generous and kind, so supportive of everyone.--a nurturing person, even as a child. I met Leslie when we were 9 or so, and that was the beginning of a very close friendship for many years. Starting in her late teens and 20s, though, it was hard to keep up with her, but in a good way. Her life and her location, seemed to change all the time as she would follow her heart, her passions, and her interests to different cities and states. She loved learning--no matter what the subject. Ok, maybe not Math too much, but absolutely everything else, including French and biology/environmental topics. Even juggling! She would watch her high school friend Mitchell Zeidwig juggling and balancing objects on his nose, and then she would me all about how wonderful and amazing it (and he) was. She came along on many family vacations; we went together to St. Maarten, Vermont, Montreal, and on lots of shorter trips. We were very often at each others houses talking, playing, playing music, talking about boys, about books, about everything, and eating---eating a lot. (How come she never gained weight and I always did?) She liked sports or maybe just exercise. I remember how much she enjoyed horseback riding at summer camp. Years later, when we were applying to colleges, she told me excitedly that she had found a particular college where you could major in horseback riding...and she was serious about it, too! Her greatest talent, I think, evident from childhood, was art. What an artist, in every way. She had a great sense of color. I loved her colorful

clothes, artistic fabrics, hats, jewelry, hairstyle ideas. She was so good at fashion and at drawing, especially cartoon-like drawings. One day I came over to the Bell family house and she showed me how she was secretly starting to paint the walls of her bedroom with various characters and images. I thought it was so beautiful! I'm not sure what happened with that project...did mom find out? Leslie was musical, too. She played the piano and had a good ear. I remember her ragtime music phase, and that famous Scott Joplin song-- "Maple Leaf Rag"-- that she learned and played absolutely everywhere there was a piano. It always seemed that Leslie wanted to get away from home--to go out and see the world. But as much as she wanted to get away, I think deep down she also wanted stability. I think in the back of her mind, even as a young person, she knew that she wanted a family some day, a Jewish family, with a lot of children surrounding her whom she could adore and love, and who would love her right back. She found in Jay someone who shared that vision, someone grounded, and someone who loved her a lot and vice versa. She was a great mother and an excellent friend and wife.

Little funny story--Leslie had a cat named Zippy back when we were in either middle or high school. A very cute kitty! Fast forward to the birth of daughter Tzipporah. Leslie was talking to me, I think, on the phone and when I asked what the baby's name was, she said "Sippy," to which a totally startled me replied, "You named her after your cat??" (I had heard the name as Zippy.)

Ahhhhh.....the last time I saw Leslie and Jay and the family was in Zurich. Then they moved to Austin, and that's where I left off. Many years went by.

The world has lost a gem of a person.....but she lives on, literally, forever, in all of the children and in Jay's heart.
