



Eli Theodore Stuart

November 18, 2003 - December 5, 2023

Eli Stuart, age 20. Eli, a sophomore at Brandeis University, suddenly and unexpectedly took their life this past Tuesday night.

Eli (they/them pronouns) was an active and cherished member of the Congregation Beth Israel community. They were on the Board of Austin Temple teens, and in that way instrumental in sustaining the high school youth group through the depths of the COVID-19 lockdown. Eli was also active in the 11th and 12 grade Post Confirmation class, and will be forever remembered for playing, with sweetness and good humor, the role of “Haman” in the annual Purim spiel.

Eli was studying Neuroscience at Brandeis University, where they aspired to do research into the neurological connections between physical and emotional pain. Activism was precious to Eli, whether the cause was disability rights or LGBTQ advocacy. They had also found a cherished second home in Hillel at Brandeis.

Eli’s funeral will take place Monday morning at 10 AM at the Beth Israel Cemetery, located within Capital Memorial Park in Pflugerville. A live stream of the service will appear on the Austin Natural Funerals Facebook page, <https://www.facebook.com/AustinNaturalFunerals>, a few minutes before the service begins. A Facebook account is not required to watch. If a pop-up window

appears asking you to log in click "not now" and the live stream will be available for you to watch. If the "not now" button does not appear, scroll down on the page and it will come up for you to select. The service will be recorded and available to watch after the service both on Facebook and here in the media section of Eli's tribute page.

Eli loved colorful clothing and the LGBTQ rainbow symbol was important to them. Therefore, funeral attendees should feel free to wear colorful clothing in Eli's honor.

“ Words from Linda Stuart, Alice Stuart's Mother and Eli's Grandmother:

"I was present when Elizabeth was born - we called her Elizabeth then. She was a welcome baby and everybody was happy to see her. Bright, beautiful and with a good disposition, she was logical in her thinking and not mean. Whenever we told her, "We don't do that," then she did not do it either...I was pleased to be part of her life in the early years. I made up little games for us to do together that she enjoyed and could be good at. When she was one year old, she enjoyed throwing a ball out of her playpen for me to fetch, which excited the dog and made her laugh. She also enjoyed a game of crawling up a few stairs and tossing a ball down to me, which also made her laugh. She brought so much joy into life! Her laugh was pure delight and like music! Her face was so beautiful that passersby turned to look and smile at her in the grocery store or wherever she went...I got to be there when she went to her Montessori school, got to see her explore all the learning things alongside the other children, her face showing her input of information, and she was maximizing the learning intentions of that school... I took her on little walks, let her climb trees and the climbing structures at parks, and she did everything well and with success...When her other grandmother went to France and brought back a little child's book for her mother to read to her, she input that information so well that she was putting it into sentences calling out, "Mom! Dad! Ecoute!" when she wanted them to come get her up from her crib in the morning. Years later, after I went away and then returned, she climbed a tree in the front yard, calling out to me, "Grandma! Look!" Who knew a little child could remember me letting her climb a tree, years later?... This was Elizabeth. She was beautiful, smart, strong, healthy, capable, and a joy to have around... So much was taken from her, but her struggles were not from anything wrong about her; they were things that were done to her, not things of herself. Our hearts were with her as she was reaching for adult life and freedom. We thought she had achieved that adult future of freedom when she moved to Brandeis University.

This young girl who endured and survived deep, serious damage - we wanted the best for her."

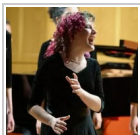

“*Eli has always been a very special person. From the time they were born, Eli impressed everyone with their brilliance and sparkling personality. Eli faced much adversity in their life but instead of turning away from people they chose to continue to stand up for themselves and others. Instead of meeting intolerance with defensiveness, Eli chose education, firmly believing that they could transform the way others thought. Eli was kind and generous, giving of their time and their love to anyone and everyone. Eli brightened my life every single day. It was not unusual for Eli to give a random compliment or tell you were fantastic in some way, just to make you smile. They made me an affirmations jar when I was going through a hard time, and I still have it on my desk years later. It is just such a perfect example of the person Eli was - concerned for everyone else and interested in making everyone else happy. Even people who barely knew them were happy to bathe in Eli’s light. The world is a darker place without Eli. Certainly my world is.*

I have been replaying some of my favorite Eli memories over and over this week. When they were about 3, they asked me for a pair of sparkly shoes saying “I NEED THEM.” Who could resist that little face? As they grew, Eli became interested in everything and loved to share that interest with anyone willing to listen. We spent hours talking about Harry Potter and Percy Jackson - stories in now reading with my own daughter. Eli studied the bats in Austin, trying to bring awareness to creatures they felt were misunderstood. Eli was a strong disability advocate and as a teenager presented to the Texas senate on issues of disability awareness and rights. They never backed down from a challenge. It is so hard to think Eli didn’t feel like they belonged in this world, given all the people they touched, but now they are at peace at last.

I once had an issue with packaging a sale at the market, and they did it for me without a second thought. Similarly, we once had dinner at sherm and hearing about their interest in Bats was really nice, I was struggling at the time and just sitting with someone like them was helpful. Eli also brought such intelligent conversations to the class we were in and seemed to give everything such effort. Their etsy shop was no different, I remember watching them work on custom orders next to me all throughout the market while I just sat there chatting and drinking boba.

However, while typing this, I'm filled with regret. Regret that I didn't reach out to them this year, that I failed to maintain a friendship with such a wonderful person, and regret that I let us become distant. My feelings are unable to be properly typed, but I believe Eli has changed my mindset on friendships. Though we remained friendly, I never took it upon myself to reach out to them, despite my desire to. I'd always feel like I needed more me-time, or I was too busy, or that hanging out with people made me too anxious. Oftentimes those were true, but Eli was someone I could've and should've pushed myself to reach out to more. Looking back at my memories of them, I know that, if I had pushed myself to do so, I would have been grateful.

There are many parts of Eli I hope to carry with me, and hope others to take note of as well. Namely, their compassion, resilience, and individuality. But, most of all, I will let their memory push me to reach out to those I care for as much as possible in the future. Eli, though someone I didn't grow as close to as I had hoped, will forever hold a motivating presence in my mind. I regret not knowing this lesson sooner and am ashamed to learn in this way, but I will forever thank them for teaching me.

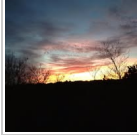
