June 22, 1934 - December 15, 2023

Joann ("Nina") Brenner, Mother of seven, grandmother to eleven, and great grandmother to two passed on December 15, 2023. She began life as a mischievous and feisty child in Sardinia, Italy, surviving through the ravages of World War II. She yearned for a better world that only she could create, and as a young woman left her family to move to Rome to begin a better life. Working as a nurse and, at times singing in coffee shops, she lived the life of an iron willed, independent woman. At a party, she met a young medical student, Max, a holocaust survivor. They married, and as they started their family, she and Max boarded other medical students to support themselves as Max worked through medical school. With friends they began a tradition of dinner table debates that carried over to family dinners amongst their seven children. The family dinner table was always lively to say the least. Although Max loved Italy, they chose to immigrate to the United States, hoping for a life of greater possibility for their family.

Sometimes the world is not as we wish, but Nina tenaciously, at times mythically, molded her world to meet her expectations. She loved babies, her gardens, antiques and works of art that reminded her of the palaces of Italy, Italian opera, singing, cooking, and traveling. When visiting Italy she was proudly American, when home in the United States she was proudly Italian. Of all her joys, her family, especially her grandchildren and great grandchildren, brought her the most. That joy and love was expressed in how she

encouraged, nourished, and molded them to achieve their highest potential.

Those who had the pleasure of loving her will miss her deeply.
