



## Kerry Baker

January 30, 1951 - August 23, 2021

On Monday, August 23, 2021, Kerry Baker, longtime Austin rabbi and father of three, passed away at age 70.

Rabbi Baker was born on January 30, 1951, in New Rochelle, NY. After graduating from Colgate University and attending Hebrew Union College (HUC), he received rabbinic ordination in 1977 and was awarded an honorary doctorate from HUC in 2002 for his dedicated service as a rabbi.

He served pulpits in Plattsburgh, NY and Seattle, WA, directed the Santa Barbara Hillel, and was the founding director of the Jewish Education Association in Portland, OR, which later merged with Hillel Academy to become Portland Jewish Academy. He came to Austin in 1987 to serve as the executive director of the Texas Hillel Foundation at UT-Austin and after 10 years founded Congregation Kol Halev, Austin's post-denominational congregation for progressive worship. In 2009, drawn to share Judaism with a wider audience, he created a website, [everybodyneedsarabbi.com](http://everybodyneedsarabbi.com), to help all spiritual seekers gain access to and learn from Judaism as a global wisdom tradition.

Rabbi Baker was known for his commitments to social justice and interfaith work, and for his affection for Jewish humor. He performed the first state-sanctioned same-sex marriage in the state of Texas in 2015 and participated

in Austin's Abraham Walk, an interfaith dialogue initiative. He devoted a significant part of his career to making Judaism accessible to all as a frequent guest speaker in many faith communities and through his website. In addition to his other leadership roles, he was the "official" rabbi of the Kerrville Folk Festival for many years. Two mainstays of his time in Austin were "Coffee and Conversations at Casa de Baker," a monthly open house at his home for encouraging connection and community, and the Torah study class that he led every week, covering a few verses in depth at each meeting: the class began with Genesis about 30 years ago, and had recently begun wading into Leviticus.

Kerry was preceded in death by his father, William Baker, his mother, Estelle (Wintman) Boxer, and his stepfather, Herman "Hy" Boxer. He is survived by daughter Ilana Hamilton, granddaughter Rowan Hamilton, grandson Lark Hamilton, son Benjamin Baker, daughter-in-law Elisa McCool, Gail Sherman (mother of Ilana and Ben), daughter Emily Baker, Lynda Baker (mother of Emily), sister Bess Singer, and niece Billie Singer.

A private funeral service was held at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, August 23, 2021, at Eloise Woods, with Rabbi Steve Folberg and Cantorial Soloist Sarah Avner officiating. A recording of the ceremony is available in the video portion of this tribute page.

Virtual shiva minyan services were conducted by Congregation Beth Israel, where Rabbi Baker was a member, with Rabbi Kelly Levy and Cantorial Soloist Sarah Avner officiating; by Congregation Kol Halev, which Rabbi Baker founded, with Rabbi Cantor Robbi Sherwin and the Rev. Dr. Sid Hall officiating; and by Kol Tzedek West Philadelphia Synagogue, where his son Ben and his daughter-in-law Elisa are members, with Rabbi Ari Lev Fornari and Rabbi Monica Gomery officiating.

“ I knew Kerry as a deeply thoughtful and knowledgeable rabbi and person. The first time I met with him in his office at Hillel was to talk about finding a rabbi to officiate my wedding to a non-Jewish person. This was in 1994, before anyone in Austin was willing to perform the ceremony. And although Kerry referred Sergio and me elsewhere, I left with the impression that this was someone I could talk to again in the future. That future arrived when my 11-year-old daughter announced she wanted to have a bat mitzvah. Kerry was her tutor and our family's guide to most things b'nai mitzvah, as I had never had a bat mitzvah myself.

One of the things that always struck me about Kerry was his depth and sense of humanity, and how he used his great intelligence and knowledge of the Torah and other Jewish thought to inform his conversations and sermons about being a human being. I wish that I could remember more specifically, but I do recall a feeling of being moved and captivated in the way he could tie things together in delivering a compelling message.

When I learned more about Yom Kippur, I consulted Kerry about a deeply personal situation in which I owed someone a profound and painful apology. He helped guide me through what that would look like, how I would need to extricate my ego and my own needs from the apology and focus on naming the ways in which I had hurt and disregarded the other person. This conversation helped me move toward shedding a great burden.

Kerry and I were not in touch that much over the last 10 or so years, although we always had a warm conversation when we ran into each other. After my mother died in early 2019, Kerry called me and arranged to come to my house. We talked, just the two of us, for quite a while, and his kindness and compassion were helpful to me in my terrible grief.

I send my deepest condolences to Kerry's family. He was a remarkable human being, appreciated and loved by many.

“ In 1997, Kerry Baker asked me to meet him at his office at Texas Hillel. We had already known each other from being members of the same congregation, Havurah Shalom, in Portland, Oregon, where both his son, Ben and my daughter, Jessica were born the same year. We had a great bond even before this meeting: He brought me into the life of the Kerrville Folk Festival, doing Shabbat services with him a few years before that. He knew that Beth Israel, where I had been a cantorial soloist, had decided to hire an invested cantor, and he wanted to talk to me about coming on board as his music maven for this great new idea for a congregation he had: one that would be post-denominational, contemporary in music and practice, and be a place that was a gesher, a bridge, to an open-tent form of Judaism. That was Congregation Kol Halev - the voice of the heart. He promised me three things: That he would mentor me; he would trust my heart and he would always support me. I never forgot those words. He brought me on at Kol Halev from that very first service at Sri Atmananda school on December 17, 1997, and we worked, side by side as partners, for the next 10 years, and we studied together after that. He never broke those promises to me.

Kerry challenged me in a way that I never expected: introducing me to new and old music, incredible musicians, and Jewish text that expanded my mind. Because of him, I became an award-winning Jewish composer. The first Jewish song I wrote, a version of Shema Yisrael, was written for Kol Halev. We started the first rock Shabbat in Austin's history - only the third of its kind in the country. We continued to push the envelope with creative, one-of-a-kind b'nai mitzvah, services and much more. He had an impish grin, especially when he changed things up at the last minute! With his encouragement, I became ordained cantor, and then a rabbi. His brilliance and strength pushed the boundaries of what I thought possible in Judaism, and I will be forever grateful for who Kerry was to the Austin Jewish and music communities, and to my life. I send my love and deepest condolences to Lynda, Ilana, Ben, Elisa & Emily and to all who loved and respected Kerry Baker. Baruch dayan ha'emet - blessed is the True Judge.
