It is with immense sadness that we mourn the untimely passing on Saturday, November 22 of Larissa Herold; beloved daughter of Audrey and Tom, and cherished sister of Ilana. She is lovingly remembered by her grandmothers Irene and Judy, aunts Lilla and Rosa, and uncle Alan.

Larissa was born in Pinehurst, North Carolina, and lived in San Antonio briefly before moving to Austin with her family. Dedicated to running and her studies for many years, Larissa ran in the Texas State track meet and graduated as valedictorian of McNeil High School in 2017. She graduated from UT Austin with degrees in Mechanical Engineering and Plan II Honors.

Larissa was a trusted confidant to those fortunate enough to receive her wisdom. Her empathy and understanding were beyond her years and her integrity was unshakeable. She was happiest when sharing her energy volunteering. Her greatest joy of all was

coaching for the Special Olympics and being around kids. While our grief and loss is immeasurable, we remember Larissa as a beautiful person with a kind soul. She was 26 years old.

Whether teaching at Sunday School, singing in the choir, or participating in services, she loved spending time at Agudas Achim. Keeping Jewish traditions was very important to her, and her favorite holidays were Passover and Yom Kippur.

Even before kindergarten, Larissa was an avid reader, and always learned all she could about topics that struck her interest. She remained connected to music in many ways throughout her life. She was also a dedicated San Antonio Spurs fan, cheering for her team through thick and thin. Larissa loved and cared for all the dogs in her life, especially her best friend Betsie.

“ I worked with Larissa. I was a little older, and she was a little longer on the job, so we got to trade reassurance and advice. (I told her about bosses at previous jobs. She helped me to understand free body diagrams and security processes.) We were the only two women in our hallway for my first couple of years, so I would joke a bit darkly that if I collapsed in the bathroom one day, she would probably be the one to find me, and vice versa.

*I remember once before a meeting, I gestured across the room at her when I realized that we were the only two women in a room of about 40 engineers. In a very Larissa way, she frowned and repeated the gestures back, taking a minute to realize what I was saying, and we both ended up laughing about the absurdity of the moment. That was how it tended to be with her. I could check in with her, even about serious things, but she was a constant source of levity. I always felt charmed and comfortable around her when she would get slightly flustered and backtrack mid-sentence and say, “Wait, not like *that*!” and adjust her wording and laugh — I related to the way she’d get anxious about possibly putting her foot in her mouth or talking too much.*

I admired the way Larissa acted on her values to make positive changes at work. Concerns about the environment don’t worry every Texan, even in Austin, but she took her own initiative to meet with the manager of the lab cafeteria to advocate for more sustainable alternatives to our styrofoam to-go boxes, bringing her own research on cost comparisons, running her presentation by Tyler and me to check it was polished and persuasive. She also took charge of organizing an unofficial group for supporting gender minorities in our division, wrangling senior staff and interns alike to build camaraderie over lunch.

Larissa clearly thought of others a lot — slipping in subtle brags about her big sister’s important work, seeking me out to give a thoughtful compliment after my presentation — but she was consistently humble about her own achievements to the point of

being a bit hard on herself. So, I'm glad I got the chance to tell her that not everyone does what she did: seeing something that could be better and acting to improve it, beyond her job responsibilities. Every time we had a more in-depth conversation, I found myself looking forward to watching her step further into her own promise.

I'll miss the solidarity I felt with her over being the last ones to feel sure of the rules of lunchtime board games. I'll miss catching glimpses of her skull ring and smiling about the little goth streak hidden in that cinnamon roll exterior. I'll miss seeing her water bottle sitting somewhere and knowing her friendly face is nearby. It's a tragedy that we don't get to see any more from Larissa, but I'm really glad to have known her.

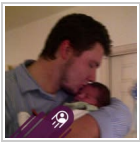
