



Dr. Paul Lee Kornblith

January 15, 1938 - January 10, 2023

Paul (z"l) was born in Philadelphia. Incredibly bright from a young age, he skipped two years in school, graduating from high school at 16, before immediately attending Temple University and Jefferson Medical College. Upon graduation, he served two years active duty in the US Army, one stationed in Korea and one in Valley Forge Military Hospital. Then 5 years in the reserves. Paul (z"l) had an illustrious career in medicine, including teaching at Harvard Medical School, serving as Chief of Surgical Neurology at the National Institutes of Health and then Chairman of Neurosurgery at Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Montefiore Medical Center, before being appointed professor and vice chairman at the University of Pittsburgh Cancer Institute and Medical Center.

In 1993, growing out of his life-long research into tissue culture he founded a bio-medical company, Precision Therapeutics in Pittsburgh. A pioneer in precision medicine, and an anchor of Pittsburgh's then-new biotech sector, the company grew cells from cancerous tumors and then tested chemotherapy medicines in the lab rather than on the patient. The technologies honed as the company's CEO and scientific leader have extended thousands of people's lives. Employment at PTI grew to a peak of over 200 employees, in 2019 PTI merged with Helomics Corporation, now a subsidiary of the multi-billion dollar pharmaceutical company, Predictive Oncology.

To be closer to family, he made the decision to move to Austin about two years ago. Paul (z"l) loved his family and enjoyed sharing his passion for history, toy trains, and antique tools and furniture with his children. He was fond of family drives with his children, looking for antiques and sharing reflective conversations about their lives. Paul (z"l) valued a strong work ethic, constantly searching for knowledge, and had a deep love of music. He was 84.

“ Paul Kornblith was a true visionary and a wonderful neurosurgical-scientific mentor. At Massachusetts General Hospital, he developed the techniques to grow glioma cells in vitro, and devoted his life to experimental therapeutics. He had leadership roles at the NIH and Albert Einstein School of Medicine. Our paper with Nicolas de Tribolet on the demonstration of lymphocyte-mediated cellular cytotoxicity was one of the first papers demonstrating that lymphocytes from a patient with a malignant glioma, but not patients without brain tumors, could target and kill the glioma cell, anticipating the explosion in cellular immunotherapy of the current generation of immuno-oncology with immune checkpoint blockade, cytokines, CAR T cell and dendritic cell therapies. Paul Kornblith was relentless in the pursuit of scientific truth and solutions. He had a great, infectious, enthusiastic spirit. He will be sadly missed but his legacy is enormous. Steven Brem, MD

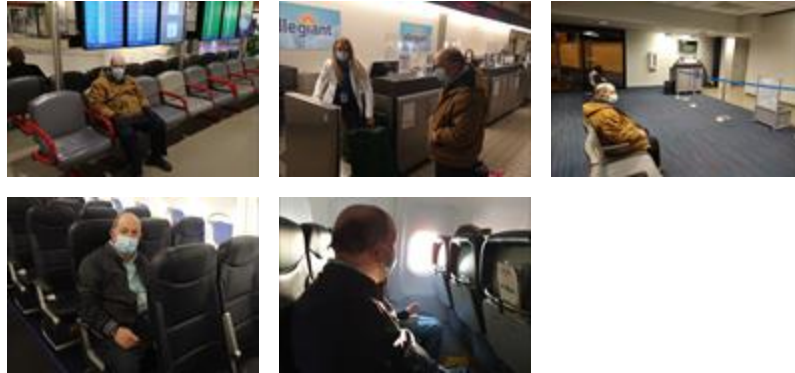
